## **ACTIVE TRAVEL**

The members will be aware that an allocation of €6.66m was provided by the National Transport Authority to Tipperary County Council for the Active Travel Investment Programme 2022.

The Council delivered an ambitious Active Travel Programme and a range of improvements for pedestrians and cyclists were completed in many towns and villages across the county during the year, resulting in a final drawdown in funding of €7,476,776.

On 1st February 2023 the council received notification from the National Transport Authority of an allocation of €4,633,000 for Active Travel Schemes in 2023 (see full details hereunder).

## **PUBLIC LIGHTING**

A new Public Lighting policy was adopted by the Council in December 2022. Public lighting queries are dealt with daily by the Roads Section, the Customer Service Desk and the Municipal/Borough Districts. Enerveo (formerly SSE Airtricity) is notified of the relevant queries and corrective action is taken as appropriate.

Tipperary County Council has responsibility for the management and maintenance of more than 17,800 lights in the county and public lighting is the biggest user of energy in the Council's overall energy usage. Upgrading of lights to LED is ongoing in advance of the PLEEP project commencing.

# INCREASED PENALTIES FOR MOTORISTS WHO MISUSE DISABLED PARKING PERMITS OR ILLEGALLY PARK IN ELECTRIC CHARGING BAYS

Elected members should note that the Minister of State for Transport, Ms. Hildegarde Naughton, has signed regulations introducing new Fixed Charged Notices for the following offences:

- The misuse of a disabled parking permit. This offence will incur a fixed charge penalty of €200.
- Parking in an electric charging bay for anything other than the intended purpose of charging a vehicle battery. This offence will incur a fixed charge penalty of €80.

These penalties came into operation on 1 January 2023.



#### **HEDGE CUTTING**

The 2022/2023 Hedgecutting Season commenced on 1 September 2022 and runs through to 28 February 2023. Tipperary County Council would like to thank owners and occupiers of land adjoining roads who inspect trees and hedges on their property during the hedge cutting season and ensure that they do not pose a danger to road users. Examples of hazards include dead or dying trees, ditches or hedges interfering with traffic, blocking footpaths, obscuring road signs, public lighting or road users' visibility.

Tipperary County Council requests the co-operation of the public in keeping road users safe. A public awareness campaign began in September 2022 and will continue throughout the hedge-cutting season. The Council's District offices carrying out local inspections and notices will be issued as necessary to relevant landowners.

All landowners and occupiers of land are requested to note that Section 46 of the Wildlife (Amendment) Act, 2000 prohibits the cutting, burning or destruction of any vegetation growing on uncultivated land or in a hedge or ditch during the period 1 March to 31 August each year. This is to ensure the safety of birds and other wildlife.

# NOTICE TO LANDOWNERS AND OCCUPIERS OF LAND ADJOINING PUBLIC ROADS ROADS ACT 1993, SECTION 70 ROADSIDE TREES, DITCHES AND HEDGES

FROM 1 SEPTEMBER 2022 UNTIL 28 FEBRUARY 2023

Tipperary County Council wishes to give notice that under the terms of the Roads Act, 1993, Landowners and occupiers of lands are obliged to take all reasonable care to ensure that the trees, ditches, hedges and other vegetation growing on their lands are not or could not become a danger to people using or working on a public road.

Examples of hazards include dead or dying trees, ditches or hedges interfering with traffic, blocking footpaths, obscuring road signs or obscuring the view of the road ahead. You are required to fell, cut, log, trim or remove such trees, ditches and hedges.

#### **PLANNING SECTION**

#### **County Development Plan**

A new Tipperary County Development Plan 2022 – 2028 for the entire county of Tipperary was made on the 11<sup>th</sup> July 2022 by the Elected Members of Tipperary County Council. The new County Development Plan became effective on Monday the 22<sup>nd</sup> August and replaced the South Tipperary County Development Plan 2009, as varied, and the North Tipperary County Development Plan 2010, as varied. From this date, and for six years, new development in Tipperary must reflect and embrace the planning vision, policies and objectives of the County Development Plan.

The County Development Plan will operate as a blueprint for the future development of the county. The publication of this Plan marks the culmination of a two-year process whereby the Plan was made by the Elected Members of Tipperary County Council with the advice of the executive and in consultation with the public. This Plan is historic as it is the first ever all-county plan prepared for Tipperary, setting out a progressive and sustainable vision for our county.

The Plan will guide sustainable development for our communities through protecting our environment, reducing our energy demands, maintaining the viability of our towns, villages and rural communities and supporting job creation. The implementation of the plan will be monitored over its lifetime.

## Local Area Plans for Clonmel, Nenagh, Thurles and Roscrea

With the Tipperary County Development Plan 2022-2028 now in place, progress on the preparation of Local Area Plans for the Key Towns and District Towns in the County has commenced. The Tipperary County Development Plan 2022-2028 sets out a Core Strategy for the development of towns and villages in the County. The plan sets out the character, potential and vision for growth as demonstrated in the Town Profile Plan for Key and District Towns which will inform the preparation of a new Local Area Plan. The Town Profile Plans set out a baseline for the towns with key socioeconomic data such as jobs ratio, transport modes, housing stock etc. In particular, the compact growth area and walking and cycling proximity as indicated, will support low-carbon development patterns including local transport planning and town centre

The Planning Section has commenced the background research and survey work and an external environment team have been commissioned to prepare the Strategic Environmental Assessment, Appropriate Assessment and Flood Risk Assessment. Workshops have taken place with Elected members in October 2022, an Issues Paper published for each LAP and Public Consultation Events took place in November 2022. Further workshops will take place with the members over the coming months.

A draft Roscrea Local Area Plan will be published in Q1 2023 and further public consultation will take place in accordance with legislative provisions.

Draft Local Area Plans for Clonmel, Nenagh and Thurles will be published in Summer 2023. Further public consultation will take place in accordance with legislative provisions.

## **Residential Zoned Land Tax**

As set out in Housing Policy Objective 15.2 of Housing for All, a new tax to activate land for residential purposes, and which will in time replace the Vacant Site Levy, has been introduced by the Department of Finance and the Revenue Commissioners in conjunction with the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage as a Land Activation Measure.

The Residential Zoned Land Tax provisions of the Finance Act 2021 set out criteria to facilitate the identification of lands which fall within the scope of the tax. The Planning Authority are responsible for preparing and publishing maps based on this criteria. These maps are to be based on the local authority development plan and where relevant, local area plan zoning maps i.e. where land is zoned and suitable for residential development. The legislation also sets out certain lands which are to be excluded from the scope of the tax.

All land that was zoned for residential development, or residential development and a mix of other uses, in a development plan or local area plan, before 1 January 2022 and which remains subject to the relevant zoning on that date, is liable for consideration within the initial scope of the Residential Zoned Land Tax. This is intended to encourage activation of existing planning permissions on lands which are identified as being in scope and to incentivise suitable lands without planning permission to commence the process of engagement with planning authorities.

Draft maps were published on November 1<sup>st</sup> and were subject to a consultation period until January 1<sup>st</sup>. The submissions made are being assessed in accordance with the Section 28 Guidelines and



Circular NRUP 07/2022. Further review and assessment will be undertaken with Supplemental Maps to be published in May and final maps to be published in December 2023. The draft maps and submissions are available for inspection at the Council offices and on the Councils website.

#### **Town Centre First (TCF) / Town Regeneration Officer (TRO)**

Tipperary County Council was awarded funding earlier this year of €100,000 to deliver a Town Centre First Plan for Roscrea Town. The funding has been awarded under the Department of Rural and Community Affair's "Our Rural Future", Ireland's Rural Development Policy 2021-2025. The plan will help to develop Roscrea's own unique vision and plan for its future development and once complete, will provide a basis for the town to seek support from multiple funding streams, including the Rural Regeneration Development Fund, (RRDF) and the Town & Village Renewal Schemes. A Town Regeneration Officer was appointed in November by Tipperary County Council and will initially work with Roscrea as the first pilot town in the County to have a TCF plan developed. The first steps will be to establish a Town Team for Roscrea for which expressions of interest were received as part of a public consultation process during the summer. A contract will be awarded shortly to appoint consultants to support the delivery of the Town Centre First Plan with the TRO and a timeframe for completion has been set for the summer of 2023.

#### Urban and Rural Regeneration and Development Fund: Project Implementation

The National Development Plan (NDP) 2018-2027 established four new funds to help drive the specific core priorities detailed in the NPF (National Planning Framework). These four funds included an Urban Regeneration and Development Fund administered by the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government and the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund administered by the Department of Rural and Community Development. The following projects are currently being delivered.

Clonmel 2030 Transformational Regeneration seeks to develop a multi-dimensional, public/private/community partnership proposal for Clonmel, which will re-imagine how civic, cultural, educational, enterprise and tourism uses can work together to regenerate and create a new role for the town. The project includes four intrinsically linked and integrated pillars, namely: Kickham Barracks Regeneration, Clonmel Regional Sports Hub, Clonmel – Flights of Discovery and Clonmel Public Realm Enhancement. Funding was received for proposed Category A works in 2019 relating to Kickham Barracks Regeneration Phase 1 and Clonmel Regional Sports Hub.

The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total** project costs approved are € 15,163,247 and URDF grant awarded is €10,594,961.










**Clonmel Regional Sports Hub** 

Liberty Square Enhancement Scheme, Thurles seeks to deliver a vibrant Liberty Square at the heart of Thurles: a place to live, shop, work, socialise, play or "hang-out". The revitalised Liberty Square will become an engine for growth in and around Liberty Square and will enhance the attractiveness of Thurles as a place to live and a place for investment / employment. Funding was received in 2019 to undertake works to the Eastern end of Liberty Square and to develop a new car park off Liberty Square. Additional funding of €1m was secured in March, 2021 to undertake enhancement works to the Western end of Liberty Square and the junctions of the approach roads. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. Total project costs approved are €10,700,000 and URDF grant awarded amounts to €5,390,291.

A Pathway to a Low-Carbon Society: A Centre of Excellence for Sustainable Energy driving the transformational urban regeneration of Nenagh: -The proposal is to develop a Centre of Excellence for Sustainable Energy, to be the anchor and catalyst for the redevelopment of Martyr's Road Regeneration Quarter, a 10 ha. strategic site of brownfield lands and underutilised properties located



in the heart of Nenagh Town Centre. The Centre of Excellence, taking reference from best international practice, will uniquely host a range of public agencies working collaboratively to deliver innovative solutions from training and development, to new cutting-edge research on technologies, to incubating low-carbon social enterprises. The Centre has been designed to be Ireland's first carbon neutral and energy positive building. The works to be supported also include Public Realm and Amenity Enhancement to Friar Street Civic Plaza, Martyr's Road Town Park, Martyr's Road streetscape improvements, including cycleways. Funding was approved in March, 2021 under the Second Call for funding support from the Urban Regeneration Development Fund. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total project costs approved are €12,700,000 and URDF grant awarded amounts to €9,525,000.** 



Sustainable Energy Centre of Excellence, Nenagh

**Tipperary Town Regeneration** - This is a significant regeneration project for Tipperary Town which will greatly enhance long term sustainable tourism for the area. It includes: Upgrade of the Market Yard as a pedestrian priority area linking the Excel Heritage Centre to Market Yard and the Town Centre; Development of an 800m gravelled walkway parallel with the existing river channel and connecting to the existing path near Glenview; Installation of a new pedestrian bridge to access the walkway from the Link Road. Funding was approved in 2018 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. The

#### **Fethard Town Park**

The project proposal is for the development of a community sport and recreational campus, incorporating a community pavilion, playing pitches, walkways, parkland and open spaces. The project was developed through a partnership approach with Coolmore Ireland, Cashel and Emly Diocese and Healthy Ireland. Funding was approved in 2019 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. Total project costs for Phase 2 Pavilion and Public Realm Works are €3,137,927 and RRDF grant amounts to

€3,003,445. Groundworks and pitches were funded by the Magnier Foundation (Coolmore Ireland) who have also agreed to fund the stand and community annex of the pavilion. Revised project costings for Phases 1 and 2 now amount to €7,092,521. Total project costs for Phase 2 Pavilion and Public Realm Works are €3,137,927 and RRDF grant amounts to €3,003,445.

## Templemore Town Hall Enterprise and Cultural Centre with Civic Plaza

The project proposal is a flagship urban regeneration project to conserve and establish Templemore Town Hall as an economic, cultural and community hub of the town, the District and the Mid-West Region. The project was prepared by the Council in partnership with Garda Training College, Templemore College of Further Education, Templemore Community Development Association, the Local Enterprise Office and the Tipperary Energy Agency. Funding was approved in 2019 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. Total project costs approved are €2,810,000 and RRDF grant amounts to €2,107,500.

#### Nenagh Historic & Cultural Quarter - A Tourism-led Regeneration Plan

It comprises a Plan to regenerate specific existing buildings and civic spaces of distinction and value within Nenagh (including The Gaol, The Castle and Banba Square) to stimulate tourism growth and revitalise the local economy/visitor economy within a context of tourism-led regeneration, comprising arts, history, heritage and culture. The focus will be on the development of 3 Flagship Pillars and 3 Supporting Pillars, collectively offering an immersive tourism experience. Funding was approved in 2020 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total project costs approved are €896,712 and RRDF grant amounts to €672,534.**

# A Pathway to the Regeneration of Cahir Town Centre: Re-establishing the Historic Square as the Living-Working Quarter

A suite of measures that will re-vitalise Cahir's historic Square as a living-working quarter. The project will provide a dynamic town centre Square with a focus on pedestrian priority and civic space. The redevelopment will be focused around Market House, a flagship Business Development Centre based in one of the most historic buildings on the Square. Funding was approved in 2020 under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total project costs approved are €986,354 and RRDF grant amounts to €663,362.**

Thurles Market Quarter: Regeneration through Recreation, Education and support for Local Producers is a collaboration between Tipperary County Council, Thurles Lion's Club and Mary Immaculate College Thurles. The project will provide a designated market space in the town centre for local food and craft producers, artists and performers; will offer a location in the centre of a cluster of civic spaces to be enjoyed by locals and visitors while also acting as a base for the MIC Students' Union. The project was awarded RRDF Funding in April, 2021. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. Total project costs are €3,825,700 and RRDF grant amounts to €3,443,130.





Kilsheelan – Revitalisation of Rural Villages: A Model for Cluster Housing and Low Carbon Planning The project has been developed as a demonstrator scheme to show the practical implementation of



Tipperary County Council's 'Design and Best Practice Guidelines for Cluster Housing'. The guidelines include a series of case studies illustrating how sustainable design solutions can be developed across a range of village types and site options. This project will be model for serviced site developments across the Country and an initiative to revitalise villages in Tipperary and nationally. The scheme at Kilsheelan was subject to a Part 8 process and approved by the Elected Members in July, 2019. The project also includes the development of a new public park in the heart of this picturesque village and a new arrival point for the River Suir Blueway. The project was awarded



RRDF Funding in April, 2021. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. **Total project costs are €670,833 and RRDF grant amount is €603,750.** 

## Rialto Digital & Enterprise Hub, Nenagh

Funding has been approved to prepare detailed designs and planning for the adaptive re-use of the former iconic 1940's Rialto cinema into a modern digital and enterprise hub facility using best practice and appropriate modern architectural intervention to provide excellent office, collaboration and meeting spaces. The associated brownfield site will be master-planned to explore the potential for further digital and enterprise office space, the creation of a new streetscape along Emmet Place, the potential provision of town centre residential units and the delivery of a new public amenity heart in the town centre. The Hub will be an exemplar sustainable, green, town centre regeneration project that will revitalize the town centre of Nenagh through the provision of much needed incubator enterprise space, public realm enhancement, improved permeability/linkages with existing streets and backland/infill development through planning for the delivery of town centre homes. The overarching aim and purpose of the proposal is to promote economic development and increase employment opportunities while preserving and saving a protected historic structure which was purchased by the Council in December,2020. The project was awarded RRDF Funding in January, 2022. The Project Management Plan for the delivery and implementation of this project is ongoing. Total project costs are €1,511,059 and RRDF grant amounts to €1,208,847.

#### Rural Regeneration and Development Fund – Fourth Call, Category 1 Projects

Three applications have been submitted under the Fourth Call for Category 1 projects for funding under the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund. The closing date for submission of applications was 29<sup>th</sup> April, 2022 at 12 noon. All three applications were successful in securing grant funding.



## Carrick-on-Suir Regeneration Plan - 'A Journey from the Suir Blueway to the Ormond Castle Quarter Delivering Our Community's Ambition'

This project follows on from the successful Category 2 RRDF application for the planning and design of extensive public realm enhancements in the town centre, development of Suir Blueway linkages and the regeneration of the Ormond Castle Quarter. Improvements will consist of (i) the transformation of Main Street, Sean Kelly Square, Greystone Street, Bally Alley Street and Chapel Street through the installation of high-quality public realm; (ii) provision of a new Enterprise and Digital Hub in a vacant town centre building owned by An Post on Main Street which will be managed and operated by Carrick on Suir Tourism and Economic Development Committee; (iii) the creation of an arrival point at Sean Healy Park through design, enhancment and orientation measures integrating best practice in user needs for kayakers, cyclists, walkers and other users and the integration of the Suir Blueway Tipperary into the town centre through the creation of shared spaces along the Quays

and linkages to Main Street.; (iv) public realm upgrade of Castle Street and repurposing of Ormond Castle Park as a high-quality Amenity and Biodiversity Park. Funding was announced by Minister Heather Humphreys under Phase 1 on 10<sup>th</sup>. November, 2022. Total project costs amount to €17,989,387. RRDF grant approved is €14,391,509 has been secured through the Rural Regeneration Development Fund.



## Activating Cahir's Town Centre Regeneration Strategy

This project follows on from the successful Category 2 RRDF application for the planning and design of a new Business Development Centre in the heart of Cahir, public realm enhancements in the centre of the town and the development of a car park on a central backland site. Improvements will consist of (i) the restoration and redevelopment of the vacant Cahir Market House and former Council Offices into a Business Development Centre which will be run by Cahir Development

Association and provide offices, a large training and conference room, co-working spaces and hot desks to satisfy the unmet demand in the town (ii) the refurbishment of the historic Granary building to provide a state-of -the-art library for the community; (iii) Cahir Square Public Realm Enhancements to include the recalibration of the traffic circulating around the Square to a more





rationalised flow that prioritises pedestrian and cyclist movements and the redistribution of public realm in favour of recreational space; (iv) the provision of a new car park consisting of 86 car parking spaces, coach parking, EV charging, and bicycle parking on disused backlands off Church Street which will involve the demolition of two derelict vacant buildings that were acquired by the Council under the Category 2 approved project. Funding was announced by Minister Heather Humphreys under Phase 2 on 10<sup>th</sup>. November, 2022. **Total project costs amount to €14,894,686. RRDF grant approved is €11,915,749** has been secured through the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund.

Reimaging and Regenerating Gantly Street – Towards an Age Friendly Neighbourhood for Roscrea This project will deliver a transformational change to the public space around Gantly Road and promote regeneration of town centre brownfield land through the activation of the surrounding lands. The project will be the catalyst and first phase in the implementation of the Gantly Street Age



Friendly Neighbourhood, an ambitious masterplan to create a more vibrant and appealing place for people of all ages to address specific social, environmental and economic challenges within the community. The works will involve (i) the realignment of Gantly Street to provide for improved pedestrian and cycle infrastructure in accordance with Age Friendly principles; (ii) the creation of high-quality public realm areas and footpaths; (iii) extensive bio-retention rain gardens and (iv) the provision of water

service and utilities infrastructure to service the Gantly Road Age Friendly Masterplan area. The regeneration and re-imaging of Gantly Street is critical to the overall delivery of the Gantly Street Age Friendly Neighbourhood masterplan area into the future. Development of the Gantly Street masterplan area will transform a central area of Roscrea, create opportunities to provide homes, business and amenity space for local residents to enjoy and lead to knock-on socio-economic benefits for the whole of the town. Funding was announced by Minister Heather Humphreys under Phase 2 on 10<sup>th</sup>. November, 2022. **Total project costs amount to €5,639,145. RRDF grant approved is €4,511,316 with Council cash match funding of €1,127,829 allocated to the project.** 

#### **Conservation Grant Schemes 2023**

The **Built Heritage Investment Scheme 2023** seeks to encourage conservation of structures protected under the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as amended) and in certain cases, structures within Architectural Conservation Areas. The scheme also seeks to support the employment of skilled and experienced conservation professionals, craft workers and trades people. Funding is available for successful projects (the minimum amount is €2,500 up to a maximum amount is €15,000 per application) subject to each owner fully matching the funding awarded.



The allocation for Tipperary County Council under the Built Heritage Investment Scheme for 2023 is to €126,400. This year Tipperary County Council also received an extra allocation of €21,377 under the supplementary ring-fenced funding for historic thatched structures.

The **Historic Structure Fund 2023** seeks to support conservation works to heritage structures in both private and public ownership.

The core aims of this fund are to:

- **enable** larger scale conservation works to be carried out on heritage structures which are deemed to be significant and in need of urgent support;
- encourage the regeneration and reuse of heritage properties and to help to secure the preservation of protected structures and/or culturally significant assets;
- **support** the investment of private capital in labour-intensive projects to conserve historic structures in public and private ownership for community use;
- **support** employment in the conservation and construction industries;
- **build resilience** in our heritage properties to enable them to withstand the effects of climate change.

Funding for the Historic Structures Fund (HSF) is being made available as part of *Project Ireland 2040*. Total funding available nationally under the Historic Structures Fund in 2023 will be **€4.5m**.

The Historic Structures Fund 2023 is structured as follows:

- 1. Stream 1 will offer grants from €15,000 up to €50,000 and is aimed at essential repairs and smaller capital works for the refurbishment and conservation of heritage structures.
- **2. Stream 1, Historic Shopfronts sub-stream** To incentivise the conservation of historic shopfronts, each Local Authority is invited to submit an additional application under Stream 1 for eligible essential repairs and small capital works for the refurbishment and conservation of historic shop facades, windows, signage and other associated details to safeguard them and keep them in use. Local Authorities are also invited to make an additional application for Irish-language shopfronts.
- **3. Stream 2** will offer a small number of grants **from €50,000 up to €200,000** for larger enhancement, refurbishment or reuse projects involving heritage structures, where:
- a. A clear community or public benefit has been demonstrated, or
- b. A clear residential benefit has been demonstrated (such projects must be advanced through the planning process as necessary)

A grant of over €200,000 may be awarded in exceptional circumstances where a case is made by the applicant in relation to the significance of the project and the works proposed.

**4. Vernacular Structures Stream** - In the context of the forthcoming strategy for built vernacular, the pilot stream for vernacular structures introduced in 2021 will be retained, with increased funding of €150,000. The purpose of the stream is to support conservation repairs and small capital works to vernacular structures that are not listed in local authority Records of Protected Structures or



otherwise legally protected. Such structures may be located within an Architectural Conservation Area. All local authorities can apply for funding for specific projects of between €5,000 and €10,000 for eligible projects.

Applications were invited up to and including the 23<sup>rd</sup> January, 2023. Following assessment of the applications by our Conservation Architect, a schedule of eligible projects will be submitted to the Department for consideration on or before the 10th February, 2023.



- 7 developments (202 housing units) were taken-in-charge by Tipperary County Council in 2022.
- No developments are currently with the Roads Section to be advertised for taking-in-charge.
- 1 new taking-in-charge application has been included for assessment as of 11<sup>th</sup> January 2023.
- Additionally, 4 developments have undergone jetting and CCTV surveying recently, before being issued to Irish Water for consideration.
- There are currently 21 Developer Provided Infrastructure (DPI) housing estates in County Tipperary which the Planning Authority is unable to progress at present.

#### **E-Planning**

In association with the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage (DHLGH), and the Local Government Management Agency (LGMA), Tipperary Planning Authority has successfully completed the pilot of phase one planning portal https://planning.localgov.ie. The percentage of planning applications submitted online continues to steadily increase. Set out below are the monthly figures % of E- applications received for 2022 in Tipperary. Since going live with submissions 37% of submissions received were online submissions. Work is continuing with the LGMA and our third-party providers and part 8 applications are now online with three applications from Tipperary currently on the planning portal. We continue to liaise with the other 11 iplan sites who have gone live on the planning portal in 2022. Nationally at the time of writing we have now assisted the following planning authorities to go live: Galway County, Westmeath, Kilkenny, Limerick, Waterford, Carlow, Clare, Louth, Mayo, Sligo and Laois. It is planned that the remaining iplan authorities will go live in the first half of 2023 and the apas/odsey planning authorities also.





#### Irish Planning Institute Annual Conference 2023.

Following the submission of a comprehensive expression of interest, Tipperary County Council is delighted to have been selected to host the Irish Planning Institute Annual Conference, 2023. The conference is scheduled to take place in Clonmel and will be a two day event in April 2023. A working group has been established to organise and agree the scope of the conference and will provide an opportunity to showcase the best Tipperary has to offer.

#### **Planning & Emergency Services SPC**

Four meetings of the Planning & Emergency Services SPC were held in 2022. At the first meeting held on 6<sup>th</sup> April 2022 an update on the Draft County Development Plan 2022-2028 was given and a presentation was also given on the preparation of Local Area Plans for Roscrea, Clonmel, Nenagh and Thurles and on the Finance Act 2021 – Residential Zoned Land Tax.

At the second meeting held on 17<sup>th</sup> May 2022 Anne Marie Devaney gave an update on the current stage of the Draft County Development Plan 2022-2028 and Teresa Kiely, Administrative Officer gave an E-Planning project update.



At the third meeting on 30th September 2022 Anne Marie Devaney, Acting Senior Planner gave a presentation to the meeting on the topic of Housing Delivery and Brian Clancy, Administrative Officer gave a presentation on E-Planning and Part 8s update.

The fourth and final meeting for the year held on 7th November 2022 was a Joint Meeting with the Housing SPC where a presentation was given by representatives from the Construction Industry Federation on Housing Delivery.

In late 2022 Tipperary Fire & Rescue Service took delivery of two new sets of structural fire kit for every firefighter in the county at a total cost of approximately €350k. There have been significant developments over the past 5 years in terms of thermal performance, damage resistance and the lightweight design and comfort of new kits. We have been monitoring these developments for some time and felt that now is an optimal time to invest in our kits. Developments across the sector have seen a move towards the gold coloured kits for ease of decontamination. The kits have all been individually sized and represent the first time that such a bulk procurement of PPE has been undertaken in the service.






- Dr Paul MacCotter gave a talk entitled *Ikerrin and the O'Mahers* on 20<sup>th</sup> December as part of the Tipperary People and Places Lecture Series.
- Dr Des Murnane gave a talk entitled County Tipperary in 1922 on 17<sup>th</sup> January as part of the Tipperary People and Place Lecture Series.



The latest genealogical collection to be uploaded to the Tipperary Studies Website are the cancelled Valuation Books for north Tipperary. Divided into 75 District Electoral Divisions (DED), the first release of the material covers 23 DEDs, and totals 56 volumes of rich genealogical data, ranging from 1902 to 1917, and in so doing, they cover the 1901 and 1911 census returns and then on into the later years of the 1910s. These cancelled valuation books may be used to trace the occupiers of a particular property over a period of a number of years, in many instances from the early 1900s to 1917. There are three cancelled volumes surviving for many DEDs, while for others there are only two volumes available. # Arts Service Age Friendly Roscrea



In late 2022, the Tipperary Arts Office approached Roscrea's Age Friendly Group with a view to partnering on a community inclusion project. Recognising Roscrea Age Friendly group's use of creativity and the arts to encourage participation, preliminary discussions began. The aim of the project is to create a piece of work that will reflect the history of the area, the traditions that have come through the generations and in doing so provide a wealth of rich material that will give story and energy to the next generation. To begin, artist, nature photographer and author Tina Claffey, visited the group and presented photographs and information on her book 'Portal', an immersive visual representation of Irelands bogs, which prompted in depth conversation about place, culture and creativity. In recent weeks, artist and filmmaker Michael Fortune led a series of workshops on investigative folklore where the group explored traditional beliefs, customs, rituals and crafts. Michael

is now in the final stages of compiling a selection of portrait photos and video interviews, which will yield a collection of folklore unique to the Age Friendly Roscrea group, that covers many aspects of every day traditions and customs in their area. This project will culminate in a public screening event in the coming months.

# Ukrainian Health and Well-being Support Fund

The Tipperary Arts office recently secured funding to develop a series of arts engagement opportunities at congregated Ukrainian rest centres across Tipperary. The funding for this intervention has been made available through the Ukrainian Refugee Health and Wellbeing Support Fund, the purpose of which is to promote health and wellbeing of Ukrainian refugees who have sought protection in Ireland. We are currently developing a series of positive and rewarding high quality artistic experiences across three sites in the county in February 2023. Artists working in various art forms including music and visual arts will host workshops at each centre with the aim of providing positive and rewarding high quality artistic experiences that will enhance social and communication skills, promote inclusivity, support the mental health and well-being of participants and enhance self-esteem. The proposed locations are Clonmel, Littleton and Dundrum, with the potential number of participants estimated in the region of two hundred people of all ages.





- **Artist Support Schemes** support artist's professional development across artforms and encourage artists and creative practitioners to live and work in Tipperary which is central to the long term development of the arts and culture in the County. A range of support schemes provided direct grant support to 23 artists in 2022 in Music, Theatre, Literature, Illustration and the Visual Arts. Professional development training and events, in addition to supporting artists development, also provide important networking opportunities for artists in Tipperary and is an area of arts office support consistently identified by artists as of value. This spring we continue our online training provision in partnership with Visual Artists Ireland and partner local authorities in Limerick and Clare. In early January 2023, VAI hosted a webinar with one to one clinic providing information on making funding applications for artists and a webinar on Socially Engaged Practice will take place on Thursday 2nd February, 2023. These webinars are free of charge to Tipperary artists.
- Tipperary Artists Awards intended to support professional artists under three categories, professional development, creation of new work, reaching audiences.
- Tyrone Guthrie Centre Regional Bursary Award - Tipperary County Council will fund two bursary awards to professional artists living in Tipperary to develop work at the

County Monaghan workplace for artists.



- A range of grants and schemes to support Arts Development in the county were advertised in December for 2023 as follows:

- Local Drama Scheme Up to two development awards annually to assist groups in developing skills within the group/enhancing production values/availing of further training/availing of professional input or for other development needs/special projects.
- Closing date for above schemes is Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> February 2023 at 12 noon.
- The Arts Office also co-ordinates the Tipperary Festivals & Events Scheme on behalf of Tipperary County Council which supports



festivals throughout the county. The closing date for 2023 is Tuesday 31st January at 12 noon.

The aim of the **Tipperary Artist in Primary Schools Scheme** is to give pupils in schools all over the county the opportunity to work with a professional artist on a once-off unique project to be planned between the artist and the school. Eight projects across a range of artistic disciplines ranging from animation to visual arts, storytelling and drama took place in Tipperary schools during 2022 engaging 834 pupils in a creative arts programme. The 2023 scheme is currently open for applications with a closing date of 10th February next.

#### **PRINTS FOR SCHOOLS Initiative:**



An opportunity for Second Level Schools to utilise unique artworks in curriculum delivery. An exhibition of 32 contemporary prints by Irish artists is available to borrow from the Tipperary Arts Office for cultural and educational purposes. The prints are specially packed for easy handling and transport and include works by well-known Irish Printmakers including Alice Hanratty, Des Mac Mahon and David Lilburn. In addition, printmaking workshops will be offered to participating schools while the exhibition is in the school. The Exhibition visited three venues in 2022 and was viewed and utilised by 1067 students.



### **Heritage Service**

## **County Heritage Plan Actions:**

- The priority for 2023 will be the revision of the Heritage Plan. The SPC was briefed in their December meeting and work on this will commence in February. It is expected to have a draft in place by June.
- A funding application has been submitted to the Heritage Council for this year's programme and includes provision for a Heritage Week Grant Scheme, following on from the success of last year's pilot. The application for 2023 includes a film project exploring the extraordinary life of Charles Bianconi; an Archaeology Ireland Supplement on Cahir; a seminar for owners of Historic properties in collaboration with the Planning Dept and the Museum of Hidden History and a small seed fund to activate the Heritage Action Plan developed for Templemore last year.

# National Biodiversity Action Plan Actions:

- The Heritage Office received confirmation from the Heritage Council in January that Tipperary County Council has been accepted onto the Heritage Councils Biodiversity Officer Scheme. Recruitment for the post will take place very shortly.
- In advance of the recruitment of a Biodiversity Officer application will be made to the National Biodiversity Action Plan fund which is now open which will be handed over when they are in post.

#### Irish Walled Towns Network

- The Walled Towns of Tipperary will be launched in the coming weeks.
- To date the funding scheme for 2023 has not yet gone live

## **Community Monuments Fund**

 Applications are currently being assessed for this year's scheme. The Heritage Office oversaw four projects last year and succeeded in getting additional funds for Kilnarath Graveyard which turned out to be a very complex site. This project was done in collaboration with Ruairi Boland of the Environment Section

### **Creative Ireland Programme:**

#### **Museum Service**





In 1767 Leeson also won a competition for the layout of the town of Westport and it is thanks to his design and vision that the town exists in its present form. Two traditional craft workers were appointed as the heritage specialists - Philip Quinn, Stonemason to work with the boys and Leisa Grey textile artist with the ladies. Each group attended a number of workshops from May to September 2022. During the session's participants were taught the traditional craft skills of stone carving and sewing. Participants were tasked with each producing a piece after the sessions. These textile and stone sculptures were then curated to form an exhibition in the Museum corridor which was launched on December 1st.

#### **COMMERCIAL RATES**

Rate Accruals for 2022 amounted to €35,531,577. As at 31/12/2022 this has been adjusted to €34,610,990 following appeal results from the Valuation Tribunal, and also revisions to the Irish Water and Three Ireland (Hutchison) Global Valuation. This may be adjusted further downwards as results from other appeals to the Valuation Tribunal following ReVal 2019 are decided.

Receipts of €32,304,387 were recorded to 31/12/2022. This figure includes deferred income from 2021 in the amount of €1,413,800 – this arose where customer accounts were in credit at the end of 2021 due to the application of the 2021 Covid relief waiver.

Further adjustments, mainly in relation to vacant properties and bad debts, will be made to accounts before figures for 2022 are finalised.

## **COVID 19 COMMERCIAL RATES WAIVER SCHEME**

The 2022 Covid19 Rates Waiver Scheme has been applied to customer accounts, in the amount of €797,075. This is restricted to certain uses within the Hospitality, Leisure and Tourism categories.

#### EARLY PAYMENT SCHEME FOR COMMERCIAL RATES

1,346 customers benefitted from our Early Payment Scheme in 2021, achieving total reductions in their rates of €92,304

Preliminary Figures for 2022 show an increased take up on the scheme with 1,760 (38%) customers making savings of €187,991.

The terms for our Early Payment Scheme for 2023 are: -

- Applied to all ratepayers with an annual rates bill of up to €26,000.
- To avail of the Early Payment Reduction of 6%, subject to a maximum of €600, payment of rates must be made in full, by 31st July 2023.
- Customers paying by Direct Debit can avail of the scheme if payment is made by September 2022.

The scheme is open to customers with arrears on their accounts where they meet the following requirements:

- a) Pay a minimum amount which is equivalent to the annual rates by the same timelines outlined above and
- b) Enter into a structured payment plan to address and eliminate arrears.

#### **VACANT PROPERTY RELIEF**

Commercial Rates remain payable on vacant property. Where a property is vacant on the date of making the rate, owners must notify the local authority and advise that the property is vacant and for letting, or is closed for refurbishment or repair.

Vacancy relief will be applied to qualifying property in accordance with the following scale:

Category	% Relief/Payment
Qualified Vacant Properties with a rates bill up to €5,000	100% Vacancy Relief
Qualified Vacant Properties with a rates bill over €5,000, but less than €10,000	85% Vacancy Relief 15% to be paid
Qualified Vacant Properties with a rates bill over €10,000	70% Vacancy Relief 30% to be paid
